FIN FUR AND FEATHER VENTURING SKILLS WEEKEND —

Since the last newsletter, the Fin Fur and Feather club opened its doors to the Venture Crews of the area during the weekend of May 20th to the 22nd.

Venturers are young male and female youth 14 to 20 years old. They have the opportunity to learn and shoot archery, shotguns, rifles and pistols and many other activities. At any Connecticut Scout camp, a Venturer can only shoot .22 Rifles and Pistols, along with Shotguns. At the Fin event, all firearm types and calibers are opened to them. These firearms come from the adult volunteers. The volunteers range from those in Venturing and members of our club.

If it were not for the support of the Fin Fur and Feather Club, this event would not be a success. We had 39 participants this year coming from six different units. These units came from Connecticut and Long Island, New York. There were 27 youth, of which 17 youth had never shot a firearm before, and 12 adult leaders. There were 6 adults'

leaders who also never shot a firearm before as well. There were so many happy and smiling faces from all, showing how much fun and excitement can be had from a firearm hobby. Several of the youth we heard saying that they wanted their own firearm.

Since the Fin does not run this event, the hours donated do not count toward Fin service time, I would like to especially thank the Fin members who donated ammo, equipment or their time to this event:

- Michael Sobol and Randy Russo donated hundreds of shotgun rounds, their shotguns and instructed the skeet and trap fields.

ARCHERY COMMITTEE

We have had the following shoots:

- March 20th with 35 participants, bringing in a total of \$330.00.
- April 10th with 24 participants, bringing in a total of \$241.00.
- April 24th with 24 participants, bringing in a total of \$230.00.
- May 1st with 15 participants, bringing in a total of \$130.00.

We have three more shoots to go on May 29th, June 5th and June 26th.

The archery range has last year's three new targets, and this year we added metal holding stands for them that will make it easier to move around. There is also a new orange square target, for use with cross bows. If you use the standard targets for a cross bow, you must use the oil on the bolt, which is used for 3-D targets, to get the bolt out. Please remember NO BROAD HEADS on the archery range.

I cannot express my gratitude for all of those who help with the setup and takedown of the 3-D targets. Without them, these shoots would not happen. Also with Trish Michaud for running the kitchen, keeping all of the shooters and work persons fed with awesome breakfast and lunches.

This is the end of my refurbishment plan for refitting the archery at the Fin. Since 2010, when I took over the Archery program, the Fin has purchased forty-eight targets ranging from small to extra-large sizes. Most of these targets will last over the next five or more years. Some, which were from different companies, were not the best for our shoots and have been moved to the Archery Range. We also purchased metallic stands, which can hold most medium and large targets, making it faster to set up and take down the 3-D targets for the shoots.

If you have not partaken in a 3-D shoot yet, and like to shoot archery or like to bow hunt, please come out and support the club by shooting a 3-D shoot. You will have an opportunity to shoot at turkeys, a Woodchuck, a Bobcat, lots of Deer including Mule Deer, Bears, a Timber Wolf, an African Lion and Alligator, an Elk or Buffalo, a T-Rex, Triceratops or Dragon, several Javelina, a Black Panther, an African Leopard, a Black Buck, a Wild Boar and a Warthog. Take a leisurely walk in the woods and shoot archery!

HUNTING BADGES

Please mark your calendars as you will need to purchase your 2016 badge prior to October 1st. After that date, no badges will be issued, unless you are a new regular member. You must fill out your permission slips, for selecting the type of hunting activity you would like, selecting your fall hunting group, and finally purchasing your badge. Come September 30th, if you have not completed your work hour requirement, or paid your obligations, you will be notified. You must pay for those work hours, and any outstanding obligations or you will lose your hunting privileges and your badge. Tremendous amount of work goes into this program from permission slips, organizing forms, verifying information on the permission slips, notifying members that information was incorrect or left out, cross checking work hours, obligations paid for, and finally issuing badges. This is to ensure that everyone is eligible to hunt, after meeting those requirements.

It is your responsibility to make sure that information, work hours, obligations, and payments have been completed to purchase your badge. Please keep your receipts. It is not up to the Hunt Chairman nor Club.
